MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Happy New Year to all of our members. I hope your holidays were as good as can be expected for a country very much in lock down! I hope you are all well and keeping safe - it isn't over yet

Last year was a year of firsts. First time the country was shut down from people planning to enter, first time that a thriving economy was brought to its knees by a disease that spread like wild fire, the first time that a means to potentially eliminate the disease was developed in months rather than years, and for us, the first time school kids have been educated en mass virtually and people were encouraged to work at home if possible, the first time since our beginning we had a Christmas party without anyone in the presence of other members (except their spouses or other close family members). While many of the firsts were not good ones, it will be interesting to see if interfacing with others primarily virtually will become the norm.

In hope that you have all been busy enjoying the ancestral hunt (for some it was either that, or like many, clean the closets), our first meeting was aimed at helping those stuck somewhere in their search to get past that brick wall. One of our attendees was a friend of mine, Helene Cincebeaux whose primarily interest is Slovakia; her offer to use a data base generated over many years may be the key for some members in finding family or family origins. Helene will also be our speaker at the next meeting; her 50 years of exploration of her family homeland will be her topic of discussion.

Because of the still unknown future in relation to Covid. Many organizations, schools, work places, and anywhere where the activity does not require a physical presence (including doctor's visits, can you imagine that) are working in a virtual mode... as we will also use this means to have our meeting. This will also give us the opportunity to have speakers from anywhere (as we are with Helene, who is in Florida)... This will likely mean we will be giving them an honorarium. This in turn means that we will start collecting dues to do this. Those who paid their dues for last year (check with Mare if you don't remember) will have their dues applied to this year's dues. One of the things I started hunting for this year, are resources for searching waaaayyy back. I realize that many of you might be a long way from that, but I have several lines that fit that description. I mentioned a couple resources last meeting, Berni Rula and Soupis Poddanych Podle Viry, covering primarily Bohemia, but knew there had to be more... So, I went searching and came up with more that I sent to Mare, along with descriptions.

I want to note, that I am not a Czech speaker, nor do I read any of the languages. What I used to search was a Google Chrome browser. When I found a likely page (using Czech versions of what I wanted to

find) a Chrome affiliated translator gave me an English version for pages that I brought up. I could browse and search the page to see if I could find anything of interest to me.... like an ancestor's name, or record or a place where I knew my ancestors lived. Not all pages will be translated (and you might find some that have an English flag/button to select a translated version). But many will and that means you can read them! You don't have to be looking for way back information to use this technique.

So enough of what I have been playing with. What about you? Have you used information sent out last year for research, or maybe to keep from aimlessly decluttering? Have you set any goals for finding ancestral information? Are you stuck somewhere? What topics would you like to hear from lecturers? Please send an email so we can help you find solutions. We don't have to have a brick walls meeting to knock a hole in your problem... we can do crowd sourcing to find solutions (Another neat term coming up in this age of virtual sharing!).

We have 9 more meetings to generate a program for.... your ideas are important as is your participation in the meeting. Possible programs: Getting ready for the 1950 census to be released in April 2022, How to read records from the Czech lands, Czech history (did you know at one time a Czech rule included Poland?), Finding records in Czech archives, Doing research in the time of Covid pandemic.

SCANNING YOUR PHOTOS AND MAKING BACKGROUND NOTES

Never knew you could do this! Data attached to every photo. Nancy Loe (Sassy Jane blog) was a guest speaker for a webinar during Covid and discussed how to REALLY scan your photos. Select the .tif (TIFF Tagged Image File Format) when scanning to create a master image. This format allows you to store metadata attached to your photo, Wikipedia states is data that provides information about other data. So, with a .Tif format you can embed details like date of photo, family names,

relationships, history, and keywords. Save your picture as .tif file and you can use a metadata editing software (or Scanner program) to add your text, under the IPTC section. Irfanview is a free software that allows editing. The nice thing is that you can enter KEYWORDS, such as a Surname, so when you search your computer for files, these keywords will be included. CZECH TAX REGISTERS by Frank Vogel

The Moravian version of *Berní rula* is known by several names, the most common is *Lánový rejstřík*. Actually, there were two *rejstříks*; the first one compiled in 1656 - 1657 is called the *1. Lánový rejstřík*, and the second from 1669 - 1679 is the *2. Lánový rejstřík*. To make it easier, I will refer to them as the 1. Tax Register and the 2. Tax Register.

Due to serious unintentional (and intentional) errors, the 1. First Register was unacceptable. Yes, even in the 17th century people were complaining about unfair taxes and they cheated on taxes.

The Tax Register record show villages in a selected estate, inhabitants by name, if they have acreage or were landless, in some cases it shows the previous dweller, and other data.

Keep in mind, that only lordship subjects are listed in Tax Registers. Access the register:

- 1. type Zemsky archiv brno lanske rejstriky
- 2. select **A8Apps1 Moravsky Zemsky Archiv** or link:
- 3. www.Moravsky Zemsky Archiv
- 4. on the left side of the screen under **Aplikace**, select **Lanove rejstriky HTML** or link:
- 5. <u>www.Lanove rejstriky</u>
- 6. in the middle section, under **Obsah** are names of estates. You need to know, in what estate is researched village or town
- 7. move cursor down until you see the desired estate, click on chevron icon under column DD
- 8. click on name of researched village/town
- 9. click on **X** on right to get whole first page of the record
- 10.click on **two triangular arrows** will move to the next page or move to a previous page

Otilia Golis demonstrated cooking Bryndzove Halusky. See her demo on link below at 1-hr mark. Use Spaetzle maker, boil in water for 6-7 mins. Top with Sheep's milk Feta Cheese.

Fake Bryndza Halusky with goat cheese (Falosne Bryndzove halusky)

It's not easy to get bryndza in America, but I found a pretty good replacement. Trader's Joe sells Sheep's milk Feta cheese and it's amazing, tastes so close to the real Bryndza cheese. (or you can use plain goat cheese). Goat cheese is little too strong and not so creamy so add few 1-2 tablespoons of warm heavy cream to thin it out.

RECIPE: Potato Halusky:

1 small potato, grated finely1+ cup of flour1/3 cup of cold water or as needed1 tsp salt



- 1-2 blocks of Sheep's milk Feta cheese
- 1-2 tablespoons of warm heavy cream or sour cream salt & bacon to taste

(or small package of plain goat cheese

2-3 tbsp of heavy cream)

Lisa Alzo explained how searching Slovak ancestry can be difficult and her suggestions included: building a family tree, determine where your ancestor was from and with emphasis of immigration records. If they **immigrated after 1906**, you should consult the USCIS website:

The USCIS Genealogy Program uses indices unlike any immigration or naturalization index available to the public. Our unique Master Index system is a combination of index tools—partially automated and partially manual—that work together to identify and locate old agency files and records.












In the border areas, the seat of the parish office is decisive. If the boundaries of the parish extend to another district, the registers of the municipality are included in the district of the parish seat. A GENEALOGY TOOL -ORGANIZE YOUR RESEARCH

GenSmarts is an Add-on type of tool you may not have heard of that helps you organize your research and track what you've done; it creates a suggested "to do" list, for less than \$30. It includes records for US, Canada and the UK, and connects with genealogy websites, like FamilySearch.org or Ancestry.com, as well as major genealogy libraries. It works with many of the genealogy programs you may be using like Family Tree Maker, Roots Magic, or Legacy, etc. If you are planning a trip to Salt Lake City, it can help you create a list with the Library Film numbers. CARPATHIAN-RUSYN CULTURE:


Carpatho-Rusyns do not have their own state, they function as legally recognized national minorities with their own language mostly in: Ukraine, Slovakia, Czech Republic, Poland, Serbia, Romania, and the United States. Their locations are also called Ruthenia. Their subgroup names are Lemkos, Boykos, Dolinyans, or Hutsuls. They often use the Cyrillic alphabet. Slovakia had what was considered Western Slavic languages, where speaking Rusyns were Eastern languages. They are very religious and may have the Greek Catholic church or an Eastern Orthodox church. In the U.S. the Greek Catholics were known as the Byzantine Catholics. Some converted to Roman Catholics Maps often depict the Subor Protestants. Carpathian Rusyn area that is part of the Ukraine. Since 1989, cultural, not political, Rusyn societies were developed to preserve their heritage as a distinct people.

HISTORY -1983

Excerpt from New York Times article, Dec 25, 1983, "Many From Eastern Bloc Seek Yugoslav Asylum", by David Binder.

"Many hundreds of Soviet-bloc citizens have sought political asylum in Yugoslavia in the last two years, posing awkward political and logistical problems for the Belgrade Government, according to United Nations and Yugoslav officials. The officials said that of the 2,919 people who sought asylum in Yugoslavia in 1982...."

"...Besides the large number of Rumanians, most of whom seem to have been fleeing for economic rather than political reasons, many Czechs and Slovaks have asked for asylum. They numbered 180 in the first six months of this year and 763 for all of 1982."

For perspective, the fall of the Berlin wall occurred Nov 10, 1989, Oct 1990 started the break up of Yugoslavia, and the official end of the communist Soviet Union was on December 26, 1991.

DNA COLUMN:



The Y chromosome passes almost unchanged from father to son. Male ancestors carried their Y-DNA line along their migrations, allowing you to trace your paternal ancestry. Males can use Y-DNA to determine where their direct paternal ancestors came from, their locations in historic times and how they migrated throughout the world. If you have tested your Surname Y-DNA through a male relative at FTDNA.com, it can predict your ancestry back many generations, and your results show your surname's Haplogroup. According to the International Society of Genetic Genealogy, a haplogroup is a genetic population group of people who share a common ancestor on either their paternal or maternal line. Particular haplogroups are associated with well-known ancestral groups (from Wikipedia and FTDNA.com).

Join the Czech DNA Project on FamilyTreeDNA.com:

The Czech DNA Project was launched in late 2001 as part of a study designed to see if specific patterns emerge from correlating Czech surnames with Czech villages. The Project welcomes those persons who can trace their origins to what is now known as the Czech Republic (Czechia)X. DNA testing and genealogy data of your Czech line <u>is required to participate</u> in this study. These data are crucial especially when paired with DNA results. FTDNA accepts raw autosomal uploads of DNA results for persons who tested at other companies.
